Therefore it seems safe to administer topical azoles concomitantly with apixaban, rivaroxaban, and dabigatran.*

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*Targeted hypothermia was not associated with improved survival or neurological outcomes compared with targeted normothermia in comatose patients after cardiac arrest. Targeted hypothermia was associated with an increased risk of significant arrhythmia.*

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*Repeated co-injections of corticosteroids plus hyaluronic acid are superior to hyaluronic acid alone for the treatment of knee osteoarthritis; this benefit is shown to persist to 6 months. No significant adverse effects were caused by repeated co-injections.*

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**e95 A Project ECHO and Community Health Worker Intervention for Patients with Diabetes**

*An intervention combining the Project ECHO model with community health workers for treatment of complex diabetes resulted in a large decrease in HbA1c which did not appear to differ from similar comparison patients in the short term, but may have had some longer-term benefits.*

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
